A RESOLUTION BY THE TROTWOOD CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO ENTER INTO A WATER SERVICE AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF DAYTON, OHIO.

City Manager Pope stated that in 2009, the City contracted with the City of Dayton to provide water to City of Trotwood customers for a period of 15 years, with one 10-year extension. He explained that the term of that agreement expired at the end of October 2024, and rather than to activate the extension under the existing terms, the City worked with Dayton to implement a new, more equitable, method of determining water rates.

Finance Director Peeples shared his presentation and explained that Dayton has been using a budget system to determine water rates, which is when you include everything you need to spend from the water department and divide it by how many units you have. He suggested that when you add up all the expenses or cash outflow and divide it by a number, users most likely pay a higher rate.

Finance Director Peeples then explained a new approach, the utility method, which eliminates ongoing capital expenses being built into the rates and uses depreciation expense instead. He stated that this one change spreads the expense over the useful life of the assets, reducing charges from the City of Dayton.

Finance Director Peeples shared that by entering into this new contact under the utility method, the City anticipates saving approximately \$400,000 in the first year of the contract, and similar savings should be realized for several years thereafter, but will vary due to various economic factors. He stated that the new contact is for 15 years, with a one-time 10-year renewal. He added that he hopes to begin operating under these new terms on November 1st.

Council Member Moore asked if this means water rates will go down. Finance Director Peeples shared that over the last 10 years, funds have been drawn down because the City has incurred rate increases from the City of Dayton, but has not passed those increases on to customers. He suggested that the City needs to consider implementing small increases every year, rather than to wait and incur one large increase.

Council Member Moore questioned if customers will see a 1% increase as suggested. Finance Director Peeples stated he is simply suggesting that annual small-percentage increases are recommended and easier to budget for.

Council Member Moore commented that her water bill is high, so she is hoping this change will have an impact on everyone's budget due to the suggested savings. Finance Director Peeples shared that he is hopeful the anticipated savings will keep the City from having to increase rates.

Council Member Moore commented that speaking as a citizen, she would like to know how this agreement will impact her. Finance Director Peeples reiterated that he hopes it keeps rates from increasing.

Council Member Pearson asked about those residents who receive their water from Montgomery County. Finance Director Peeples reiterated that this discussion affects only those who get their water from the City of Trotwood, and residents who are serviced by another system, even if they live in Trotwood, need to talk to their authority. Council Member Pearson commented that whether you live on the left side or the right side, you still live in Trotwood. Finance Director Peeples agreed; however, when it comes to water systems, you are at the mercy of the authority that services your area.

Finance Director Peeples reiterated that the City has not increased rates for customers in 10 years even though the City has actually postponed passing on increases from the City of Dayton. He added that the City has also adopted a 10% discount for seniors. Finance Director Peeples commented again that he hopes this new contract will relieve the pressure of having to increase rates, and added that this should probably be an every-other-year discussion.

Mayor Page asked Finance Director Peeples to confirm the City has three water systems. Finance Director Peeples confirmed there are three water authorities that service the City of Trotwood: Jefferson Authority, Montgomery County, and the City of Trotwood.

Mayor Page asked if rates will remain the same for the remainder of the year for those receiving their water from the City of Trotwood. Finance Director Peeples agreed, and suggested evaluating the actual savings realized after a couple of years into this agreement, then maybe have a workshop to discuss any rate changes.

Council Member Finley asked Finance Director Peeples how the City can utilize the savings to impact the citizens. Finance Director Peeples mentioned current improvements, then shared that Dayton will be upgrading their meters to a model that will automatically report usage, rather than having a person in the field physically reading meters and submitting the data.

Council Member Finley then asked Finance Director Peeples about stormwater fees, and stated that it is her understanding that those fees are not supposed to be through perpetuity. Finance Director Peeples explained that he was not with the City of Trotwood when Council implemented stormwater fees; however, in his experience such fees are for perpetuity because they help to maintain things like ditches, storm sewers, certain ponds, etc.

Council Member Gales asked Finance Director Peeples if they plan to continue offering the 10% savings for seniors. Finance Director Peeples confirmed that the City plans to continue offering such discount. Mayor Page reiterated that this discount is for City of Trotwood customers.
